Creating space for growth

Dear Reader,

We often resist the change that comes with endings, because when they happen, we are forced into discomfort and the unknown. When I was going through divorce 4 years ago, my brother said: “endings are meant to be celebrated”, at the time it felt like those smart things people say whenever we go through something ridiculously hard, but it stayed with me during my time in Oranjemund as I navigated relocation to create a new home and life.

Now, 4.5 years later, as I prepare to relocate once again 😊 and the time for me to hand over the baton looms, I find myself nostalgic as I reflect on my tenure as Chairperson of the OMD 2030 Board of Directors. I feel immense pride and gratitude, pride to have been afforded the honour to lead an incredibly capable and talented team for 2 years, and gratitude for the growth that came with being a volunteer in support of Oranjemund’s transformation strategy.

OMD2030 was created to drive citizenry activation and behaviour change when Oranjemund was proclaimed and became an open town. Debbie Ashipala (current GM) along with Sue Cooper (previous GM) and Andy Garrison started operations with 2 employees (Debbie and Sue) working 2 mornings a week. That team has grown to 6 permanent and several temporary and volunteer staff working tirelessly to keep the citizens of Oranjemund engaged.

I remember texting Sue when I first saw the ad on a WA group, advertising the nomination and election of the Board at the AGM, to express my interest in serving and being rather adamant that it was for the Chairperson position 😊, obviously I would have to be nominated and elected still, but I had an internal knowing that I wanted to lead this team.

Little did I know how much this directorship would change me. It was the start of ploughing back into a community who welcomed and supported me while going through a personal valley.

The Board was elected at an AGM and appointed in May 2023.

Some of our selected focus areas were:

- Board Training (Thanks to Libertha Kapere for making the time to train us)
- Review of the Articles of Association (thanks to Andy Garrison and Sue Cooper for supporting and advising us).
- The development and execution of a Stakeholder Engagement Plan to introduce ourselves as the “New Kids on the Block”
- Establishing ourselves as Facilitator of the Town Strategic Collaboration Plan Meetings (Nominated).
- Identifying & appointing an external Auditor (only unqualified audit opinions issued thus far, thanks to Sue Cooper and Francois Karsten for cementing the foundation).
- Review of Management Reporting.
- Recruit a General Manager (One of my proudest moments as a leader – Thank you Debbie for the dedication and creativity with which you lead).
- Implement a performance management structure (Thanks to Namdeb HR for your support with this initiative)

Often, it’s not that we don’t want things to end/change, but the behaviour change required from ourselves to see through the ending (sometimes unwillingly too) and begin afresh, is so unfamiliar it causes overwhelm and resistance and we subconsciously feel threatened, hence the reluctance to change.

We cannot start something new, get through the discomfort and elevate ourselves, without creating space, by the ending of another equally important thing, because “growth and comfort don’t co-exist”. In a world where everything is about time and money, and how little time you can spend to make as much money as possible, living in Oranjemund brings you back to the basics and it sometimes feels like time slows down. If you allow yourself to become vulnerable and surrender to it, you get to notice the little things that sometimes pass us by but make life so much more worth living, because the magic is in the small insignificant moments!

I’m excited about the next phase of my journey and the prospect of appointing a new board of directors for OMD2030 (I’ve started canvassing 😊, so looking forward to the election planned for Q1 2026).

Thank you for your commitment to Oranjemund’s transformation, the long hours and the collaboration efforts. Congratulations to the newly appointed mayor HW Pankratius Kondjamba and the Council, wishing you all the best in your new assignment!

Some Highlights from Our 2025 Journey
We are grateful to share a few of the measurable outcomes made possible through collaboration, commitment, and community support:

- **2,478 visitors welcomed at the Jasper House Museum.**
- **2,612.6 kg of recyclable material collected.**
- **We have secured Berronnies Building as an inclusive space to support and accommodate children with different abilities.**
- **71 km of organized community fun runs and walks completed.**
- **Over 140 children assessed by a registered educational psychologist.**

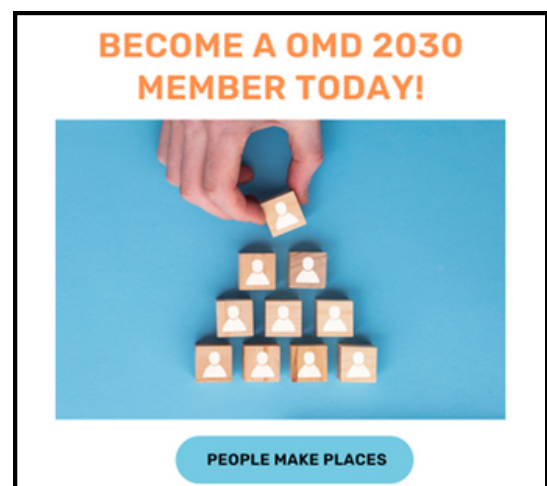

Running for Nature: OMD 2030 and Komatsu Celebrate Conservation with the Community

The OMD 2030 monthly Fun Run/Walk is a well-loved event in Oranjemund, bringing residents together through a 5 km run or walk that promotes both fitness and community spirit. In July, the event was held on 26 July in celebration of World Nature Conservation Day, giving the run a stronger focus on conservation, awareness, and collective action. The event also honoured Komatsu for their valued partnership and ongoing support of community initiatives. Their contribution went beyond sponsorship, promoting environmental stewardship and supporting youth creativity. As part of this commitment, Komatsu donated over 150 kg of boxes to the Ambrosius Amutenya Primary School art class, encouraging reuse and waste reduction.



Komatsu-sponsored arts competition highlighted young talent and the role of creativity in conservation. Street Festival strengthens Community Connections

OMD 2030 hosted a Three-day Community Festival in collaboration with the Oranjemund Town council.

Through this partnership, a three-day Community Street Festival was successfully hosted with the aim of connecting residents, supporting local SMEs, and celebrating culture and community spirit.

A pre-event 21 km run was held one week prior, with an impressive 60% of participants completing the full 21 km, a true reflection of community enthusiasm and commitment. The main event took place at Fifth Avenue, it kicked off with a vibrant street parade featuring festive floats led by bikers, drawing crowds and bringing sidewalks to a standstill. The official opening and town Christmas lighting were conducted by former Mayor, Cllr. Elias Kasemba, while Aunie Gideon, Acting General Manager of OMD 2030, shared insights on business potential and opportunities in Oranjemund.

On the day Santa arrived, approximately 350 children received Christmas gifts, generously sponsored by local companies, a heartwarming moment that highlighted the spirit of giving within the community.

A colourful photo frame became a popular attraction for picture lovers, capturing memories throughout the event.

Community members were entertained by talented local artists, with the highlight performance being the energetic Fire Drums show by MDU from Windhoek. The event was well managed, with visible police presence and security ensuring a safe and enjoyable experience for all.
